In October, our Executive Director Colleen Vogt led us in a beautiful Taize service of prayer and music for our Day of Reflection. Lura Masters provided musical accompaniment.

In November, our World Community Day service was led by a new board member Eloise Mulligan. Sally Dodgson led us in Bible Study, followed by worship. Our guest speakers represented the Muslim, Jewish and Baha’i traditions. In light of our chaotic world situation, each spoke a message of peace and good will. After worship, we were pleasantly treated to a delicious “Salad Buffet” luncheon.

We’ve had quite a year collecting books for the Rochester Education Foundation, attending the volunteer Fair at Marketplace Mall and learning about other organizations and programs by participating in the Rochester Area Administrators of Volunteer Services (RAAVS), and learn about new programs through the Girl Scouts and the Children’s Zone program. And there is still more to come! We will kick off our 85<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year with our Annual Tea on December 16<sup>th</sup>!

As we tuck ourselves into our warm houses for the winter, Church Women United does not intend to stop working to strengthen programs and keep aware of new needs of people around us.

## **Review of E.I.A. Education/Insight/Action**

Regular readers are well aware that CWU is excited about the new direction begun in 2006 and is now moving forward into our 85<sup>th</sup> anniversary year. Last spring's E.I.A. celebrations searched for areas of concern in our community and looked for specific needs where we could begin to help.

As education and parenting skills and housing rank high as areas of concern, we set in action our new directives. They include a reading group at a Rochester city school and providing formula and diapers to mothers at a shelter for homeless mothers and children (the median age of children at the shelter is 4 years). We have also begun a new partnership with the Monroe County Facility providing health kits for inmates on their release.

Encourage your friends and groups in your church to collect items for health kits for women coming out of jail. The list of items to go into these kits is in this issue of the Sundial on page 5. The completed kits packed in a quart-size Zip-Lock bag could be a project for a church group at a meeting. Contact Betty Allinger at 663-0862, or deliver completed kits to the CWU office. We will deliver them to the jail. Food for the Community Food Cupboard will be received at the office also.

If you want to join a group reading to a child at a Rochester City School District site, call the CWU office 342-2790, and leave your name.

And if you have time on your hands this winter, join our program committee whose work is ongoing. Call Betty Allinger or leave a message at the office.

At the November board meeting the question was raised whether we would like to take a stand on the death penalty issue. It was agreed that we would consider this at the February meeting after we have had time to review the national statements which are as follows:

*From CWU Social Policies: 1941-2004 p 147*

### **M. Opposition to the Death Penalty (1979)**

It was voted that the Board of Managers of CWU register its opposition to the death penalty as a violation of the laws of God and humankind.

### **N. Abolition of Capital Punishment (1981)**

Whereas Church Women United cannot accept retribution or social vengeance as a reason for taking human life because it violates our deepest belief in God as the Creator and the Redeemer of humankind;

Whereas, although Church Women United is deeply concerned about the present high rate of crime in the

United States and about the value of a life taken in murder or homicide, we also believe the life of the victim is further devalued by the taking of another life as punishment;  
Whereas Church Women United is convinced that the nation's leaders should give attention to the improvement of the total criminal justice system and to the elimination of social conditions which breed and cause disorder rather than fostering a false confidence in the effectiveness of the death penalty;  
Therefore, Church Women United declares its opposition to the retention and use of capital punishment in any form or carried out by any means; we urge the abolition of capital punishment.  
Further, the members of the Executive Council are urged to write or wire their Senators urging them to oppose the reinstatement of the death penalty in any form.

0. Against the Death Penalty (1985)

It was voted that Church Women United affirm the public witness in Atlanta, affirming the decision of the United States Supreme Court, upholding the value of life.



We soon begin our celebrations to mark the 85<sup>th</sup> year of CWU in Rochester. See the website for more details, but Sue Forsyth and her 85<sup>th</sup> Committee has put forth a challenge for us to celebrate “in deed”. Bring 85 cans of soup, give 85 hugs, donate 85 dollars, quarters or pennies. Read 85 Christian books, offer 85 prayers, talk about CWU projects to 85 people. We will keep a running tally, but as this is meant to be a fun thing, don’t worry too much about the accounting. If you ask me, “does it count if I...?”, the answer is “yes, it all counts”.

Happy Birthday CWU! Let us celebrate, let us celebrate in deed.

# Congratulations Due

## Meet Betty Allinger

Several Christians received honors at the recent Presbytery mission fair. Our own Betty Allinger was among them, nominated by her church as a Peacemaker. Here is what they said about her:

“Betty Allinger lives out her faith in her actions every day. She [joined] Church Women United in 1960. Her first project with CWU was the establishment of the first Rochester Group Home on Phelps Avenue.

After that, Betty's activities included court watching, fighting the state lottery, Calvary-St. Andrew's Soul School, action for justice after the riots in the 60's and working with family housing for over ten years. says that CWU launched her career and provided her with a safe haven to find rest, renewal and spiritual support. Through her friends there, she learned coping skills, inclusiveness, tolerance and universal love.

Betty has worked through the Presbytery locally and nationally on the Self-Development of People Committee. She was the first woman moderator of the Synod of the Northeast. Betty has been constantly involved with the Community and Global Mission Committee at Bethany. Most recently her outreach involvement has centered on Step By Step's work with incarcerated women, fighting the death penalty laws in New York State and tutoring a Sudanese woman in speaking, reading and writing in English. She is a regular contributor to Bethany's Monthly Paper with articles on current social issues and is always a most welcome member of the Mission Committee, providing direction and leadership to those interested in reaching out to others.”

### **Helps Buffalo, NY**

Humanitarian and disaster relief agency, Church World Service (CWS), has provided clean-up buckets to the City of Buffalo and school kits and health kits to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Buffalo to help with recovery needs following the mid-October snow storm.

Five hundred CWS clean-up buckets (flood buckets) were delivered to the City of Buffalo Commissioner of Community Services. 300 CWS school kits and 300 CWS health kits were delivered to the Boys & Girls Clubs of Buffalo. The Boys & Girls Clubs were grateful for the health and educational materials to help with increased numbers of children and youth visiting the clubs as a result of school closings and area power outages, according to Joann Hale, CWS Disaster Response staff person.

Church World Service is also a co-founder of the Disaster Recovery Interfaith Network of WNY, a group formed to work together to coordinate the interfaith response for long-term recovery from the disaster and to provide spiritual, emotional, and physical resources to those affected by the storm.

Communities and churches in Upstate New York are now working on assembling CWS Kits to be picked up in Spring 2007. These statewide collections of kits are delivered to the CWS distribution center to replenish stocks and help keep the organization prepared to respond to future disasters.
